HOW TO PAY PROPERTY TAXES

Property taxes are due March 31. TWPEC offers multiple convenient ways for residents to pay their tax bills.

- DROP OFF: A 24-hour drop box is available at the main entrance of the Township Office at 18 Centre Street in Spencerville for cheque payments, though cash deposits are not advised.
- BY MAIL: Residents can also avoid line-ups by mailing their payments to the Township's mailing address, PO Box 129 Spencerville, ON KOE 1XO, ensuring they allow enough time for delivery.
- IN-PERSON: Payments are accepted at the municipal office during regular business hours from Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., with cash, debit, and cheque as the available payment options-though credit cards are not accepted.
- ONLINE BANKING: For those who prefer digital transactions, online or telephone banking payments can be made using a 19digit roll number (excluding the last four digits if you bank with RBC), with early processing recommended to ensure timely receipt.

DOMESTIC FOWL OPEN HOUSE AND PUBLIC MEETING

On January 28, 2025, the Township held its first public open house meeting to discuss possible changes to the 'Hobby Farm and Domestic Fowl Coop' requirements in the zoning by-law, to include settlement areas. The intent of the open house was not only to inform residents about upcoming changes to policies or by-laws, but a chance for the public to provide comments, concerns and/or support. Most importantly it was a chance to be heard.

Approximately a dozen residents who attended the open house provided great insight on how possible changes may affect their continued enjoyment of keeping domestic fowl and coops. The discussions brought up some issues and ideas not only for settlement areas but for the rural area and hobby farm uses.

On February 3, 2025, the Committee of the Whole – Community Development held a Public Meeting to discuss the comments and information received during the open house. Over 20 residents attended and provided comments to the committee members. Information from all parties was collected and planning staff were directed to review all the information gathered to date and later return with a draft by law to be discussed at a future public meeting.

The township website is a great source of information for upcoming projects and notices of applications, open houses, public meetings as well as events happening in the area.

This year's themes promise to add extra excitement:


- Arts & Crafts Unleash creativity through painting, sculpting, and DIY projects

REMINDERS FOR RESIDENTS

REMINDER FOR RESIDENTS ON MUNICIPAL WATER SERVICES

Please take time to properly winterize your outdoor plumbing to prevent unexpected repairs and higher than usual water bills.

Residents connected to municipal water services are reminded to properly winterize all outdoor plumbing to avoid unplanned and potentially costly repairs and high water usage bills. Bylaw 2013-69 requires that adequate heating be maintained to ensure water meters do not freeze and leak. The cost to replace and install a new water meter that fails from freezing or neglect is at the owner's expense.



WINTER PARKING REMINDER

As per our Parking Regulations Bylaw, overnight winter parking is not permitted on Township streets between 1 a.m. and 7 a.m. from November 1 to April 15 to allow for proper roadway ice and snow clearing. Vehicles parked during these hours may be fined and/or towed.

The Township may also declare a winter maintenance event outside of these dates, in which case overnight parking restrictions will apply from 1 a.m. to 7 a.m. the following evening.

Additionally, when parking in your driveway, please ensure your vehicle does not block sidewalks. Kindly pull all the way in to keep pathways clear for pedestrians.





RINSE AND RECYCLE



Keeping Ontario's Recycling Clean and Effective

Recycling is a simple way to reduce waste and protect the environment, but many people don't realize that a little extra effort can make a big difference. Rinsing out food and beverage containers before placing them in the blue bin helps ensure they can be properly processed and turned into new products, reducing contamination and keeping Ontario's recycling system running efficiently.

Why Rinsing Matters

Food and liquid residue left on recyclable materials can contaminate entire batches of recycling, making them harder to process or even sending them to landfill. A single unrinsed peanut butter jar, for example, can soil nearby paper and cardboard, rendering them unusable. By taking a few extra seconds to rinse containers, residents can help:

- ✓ Improve Recycling Quality Clean materials are more likely to be successfully processed and reused.
- √ Reduce Odours and Pests Rinsed recyclables keep blue bins and collection areas cleaner and less attractive to insects and rodents.
- ✓ **Support a Circular Economy** Ensuring recyclables remain usable helps keep valuable materials in circulation, reducing the need for new raw materials.

What Needs to Be Rinsed?

While not every item requires thorough washing, it's a good habit to quickly rinse out food and beverage containers such as:

- Plastic, glass, and metal food jars
- Tin cans (e.g., soup, beans, pet food)
- Milk and juice cartons
- Yogurt and dairy containers

A quick swish with water is often enough—there's no need to scrub!

Recycling Right in Ontario

Ontario's blue box recycling system is undergoing changes to improve efficiency and sustainability by transitioning to extended producer responsibility where the businesses that sell packaging and paper products to consumers will be financially and operationally responsible for collecting, processing and recycling those materials. Transition to extended producer responsibility will take place between 2023 - 2025, with the new framework fully in place by January 1, 2026. As a result, Edwardsburgh Cardinal's blue box recycling program is now managed by Circular Materials, who is the administrator of the common collection system and a not-for-profit organization that is committed to building an efficient and effective recycling system in Ontario.

Once the transition to the new framework is complete in 2026, producers will be fully accountable and financially responsible for recycling the products and packaging that end up in recycling bins. Residents can visit https://www.circularmaterials.ca/provincial-programs/recycling-in-ontario/ to stay informed about updates to Ontario's recycling program. By making small changes—like rinsing out containers before recycling—Ontarians can help keep materials clean, reduce waste, and contribute to a greener future. So next time you finish that jar of pasta sauce, take a moment to rinse it before tossing it in the blue bin—it's a simple step with a big impact!

Council is delighted to extend our heartfelt congratulations to the dedicated students of South Grenville District High School—Grant, Avery, and Isla—who have agreed to continue this newsletter until the end of the school year. Their efforts have been instrumental in keeping our community informed and engaged, proving the newsletter to be an invaluable tool for effective communication and dissemination of township news.

Council has been bustling with activity, maintaining our regular meeting schedule while also attending the ROMA conference in Toronto. Council made several delegations to provincial Ministers and in one case we were successful in securing \$24 million dollars to improve water and sewer across Augusta, Prescott and Edwardsburgh-Cardinal. Budget planning is progressing well, and Council is steadfast in our commitment to addressing the infrastructure gap that has long been a challenge for our community. This year, we are excited to announce several key projects that will enhance our township's amenities and infrastructure. Plans are underway for a new splash pad in Spencerville, renovations to other existing recreational facilities, and a series of paving projects that will improve our roads. We have a long way to go but we are making great strides.

Additionally, we are thrilled to highlight the remarkable success of the Port of Johnstown in 2024. The Port achieved a surplus of over \$5.3 million, a testament to its vital role in our municipality. The Port continues to be a critical asset, facilitating the transport of local farm products to world market and contributing a portion of its surplus directly to the Township Capital reserves. This financial support is essential in closing our infrastructure gap, building much needed new recreational amenities without imposing significant costs or hardships on our residents.

As Stephen, Joe, Chris, Waddy and myself look forward to the upcoming year, we are inspired by the dedication and hard work of our students, our many volunteers, residents, township staff. Together, we will continue to build a thriving and resilient community for all.
